Cheryl, I'm writing in a different capacity than my usual role relating to the Washington Attorney General's role regarding charitable trusts. In addition to that role (and others), I also serve as legal counsel to the state Administrator for the Courts. In that capacity, I've been made aware of an unusual situation regarding our state Superior Court Judge's Association (SCJA). That association, at least the one properly constituted under that name, is formed under state law as the organization for the judges of our state court of general jurisdiction. I'm copying Judge Laura Inveen, the President of SCJA, on this message.

The SCJA has become aware that an individual named Christopher James Hupy has been using the name of the SCJA for various purposes. His use stems from a dispute that he had personally in one of our courts, and basically he's attempting to cause problems for the judges by using the SCJA's name. He has a Website using the name, and generally claims to be the only party legally entitled to use the name.

Among his activities, he has obtained a federal EIN (45-5592053) under the name of the SCJA. I'm attaching a copy of the letter from the IRS assigning that EIN.

Is there an administrative process that can be invoked to revoke an EIN that is issued using an assumed name to which the requester is not legally entitled? If you can provide any guidance on this matter, or

point me elsewhere within the IRS if need be, I would very much appreciate it.
